# **Little Brother Mini Presentations**

To help understand the issues we are talking about in class, specifically the ones related to *Little Brother*, you will research a topic and present your findings to the class in a mini presentation (3-4 minutes). No matter which topic you choose, be sure to make connections to *Little Brother* and our other readings/watchings wherever possible.

This is an individual project; however, you may choose to present with one or more partners by choosing related topics (see below). If you choose this option, you will receive individual marks for your research and presentation skills even though you will present together. Think carefully before committing to work with others, as there are pros and cons to group work.

- **1. Choose a topic.** If you are working with other people, you must choose topics within the same category. If you are working alone, you may choose any topic. However, only one person may choose each topic.
- **2. Begin your research.** Keep notes on everything you research, including sources. You are required to hand in all this work *before* you begin your presentation. Recommended resource: www.easybib.com (using the MLA format).
- **3. Prioritize your research notes.** You may not have time to explain everything in depth, so decide what *must* be included as opposed to what *could* be included.
- **4. Begin creating your visual aide.** For the best communication possible, you need not just a speech for the oral learners, but also aides for the visual and learners. This may be a slideshow or a handout, or both. *IMPORTANT: Do not have your oral and visual components compete with each other.* In other words, don't make your audience try to listen and read at the same time! If you have a slideshow, do *not* include every word of your speech on it. Have a maximum of 25 key words on each slide, supported by images or graphics that communicate without words (especially helpful to English Language Learners).
- **5. Plan other presentation components.** Depending on your topic, it may be helpful to include something else: a short video, an illustrative activity, etc. This is not required, but rather an opportunity for you to be creative in how you teach your topic.
- **6. Present.** You will be assigned a day to present, and you are expected to be ready to go when the bell rings. I highly suggest that if you need any tech equipment, you come in early (yes, even if that means 8:15am) to set it up and test it out.

You do not need to hand in a copy of your speech.
